Summary: (machine translated) Geologically and scenically fantastic alpine canyon below Monte Raut. Adventurous access via an old hunters path.		
Hydrology:		
Access: (machine translated) From Maniago via Montereale and the long Fara tunnel into the Cellina valley. After the tunnel, turn right towards Andreis. Before you reach the village, take a sharp right towards Sott'Anzas. After 400m, park on the right in front of a large information board (space for max. 3 cars)		
Approach: (machine translated) Follow the marked hiking trail into the Torrente Susaibes valley. At the 'Aga dal muscle' spring, ascend via CAI 979 to the NW over a sunny 250 m to a small saddle with a bench. Continue north for a short while until a hunters path branches off to the right at the highest point of the marked path (faded red markings on tree). Head NE via steep hairpin bends and then cross a somewhat awkward boulder field. The path is marked with red dots, but tends to get lost in the grass. Cross the Torrente Susaibes and ascend to the east. Do not follow the orange color markings in the direction of 'Cengia dei Garibaldini' to the north, but cross slightly uphill through the herbaceous grassy slope. Ascend to a saddle and on the other side descend about 30m to a stream. Cross further and ascend another 40m with some effort before the path crosses to the NE. Cross under a spring and reach the nameless entry stream below a waterfall at an altitude of approx. 1000m.		

Tour: (machine translated)

Downclimb about 50m through the blocked streambed, bypassing small drops in the mountain pine terrain.

40m rappel from two ring bolts on the left, preferably with a traverser rope from a tree

Mouth of the Rug del Raudlin.

15m rappel from ring bolts on the left

12m rappel from ring bolts on the right side of a clamping block

20m rappel from ring bolts on the right side of a clamping block

10m rappel from a ring bolt on the left, then through under a clamping block

40m rappel from ring bolts on the right, across both pools

5 min downclimb

10m rappel from clamping block to the left of the middle of the stream

8m rappel from ring hook on the left, possibly jumpable

5 min downclimb

25m rappel from ring hook on the left

Downclimb

10m rappel from ring bolt left, old anchor with rope sling a little further down

Downclimb, the next break is bypassed orographically to the left through a cave under giant boulders. The entry is indicated by two cairns.

In the cave old anchor with knotted rope and chain link for rappel (4m)

5m downclimb on fixed ropes with slings

10min downclimb to the mouth of the Torrente Susaibes from the right

15min downclimbing and hiking to a last mini gorge

2m jump, soon afterwards the approach path crosses
