Two jumps, small rapell then c70, then 3 more rappels.

**Hydrology:** (machine translated)

Emergency exit on the left bank at the lower end of the C70.

Above the large waterfall: beautiful pools, beautiful water, always flowing.

Small watercourse for the C70, then very often dry.

The route should therefore be hiked in spring and fall after some rainfall in order to have a sufficient amount of water in the large waterfall.

**Access:** (machine translated)

From the A8 exit in Menton, drive in the direction of Sospel. Turn right at the junction for Castellar. You will arrive in the valley at the second bridge.

**Approach:** (machine translated)

Follow the road (Route de la Condamine) for 750 m and take the GR long-distance hiking trail that leads up to the chapel of St. Bernard.

Then either:

- Continue up the path for about 1 hour. At an altitude of 650 m, after a hairpin bend where you have the valley at your back, a not very visible path leads directly over a boulder field.

From the valley, as soon as you reach the vegetation, the path becomes more visible. From there, descend to the valley as best you can.

- Reach the chapel and the Col St. Bernard. Turn left (north) and take the path on the left that goes down. You will very quickly pass a wooded canyon. Continue for about 250 m until you reach a ridge (altitude: 681 m). Take a side path on the left (yellow markings) that leads slightly diagonally back to the canyon mentioned above. The ascent begins at an altitude of 500 m at the confluence of this canyon and the Ciambairo stream.

**Tour:** (machine translated)

The first two obstacles are jumped over (with the usual precautions). An anchor (C7) leads into the pool above C70.

Good belay (improved at the exit in 2012) on the right bank. Nice finishing pool, then C20, C5, C7.

The large waterfall has a drop of 5 m and steps of 66 m.

Clear exit on the left bank at the height of the bridge.

Up until the 70-meter abseil, we always had little water flow and clear water; after that, the gorge was dry. We really enjoyed the 70-meter abseil, as well as the hike to the col.
