From Vorderriß in the valley of the Isar along the Rißbach to Hinterriß (10.7 km), from here take the toll road (2018: 4.50 euros) for another 8 km until the slope into the Laliderertal valley turns off to the right at an acute angle.\nFrom here, cycle 3 km to the bridge over the Möserkarbach. Alternatively, you can park your car where the path to the Lalidertal begins ("Lalidertal, Falkenhütte, Hohljoch").

"The access leaves us about 500m further on the slope, from which we continue straight ahead in a southwesterly direction in a sharp rightward haipin bend - a few meters before reaching the bridge over the Lalidererbach. For the following. Here is an excerpt from a mountain hiker's report: "... follow a forest road for about 2km; leave it at a rightward haipin bend (800m after the Möserkargraben), where it leads down to the Gumpenalm hut - from now on, scouting skills are required! After a short descent to Klausboden, the path leads left (eastwards) up the clearly marked Klausgraben, which is temptingly easy to follow - however, I climbed much too high and therefore later had difficulty finding the "official" tracks; on the way back, I therefore erected a cairn at the point of the Klausgraben where you have to leave it orographically to the right (i.e. left in the sense of the ascent) to get into the forest. You reach this point before the Klausgraben becomes steeper, i.e. relatively far down, at around 1200m above sea level!\n\nFrom here you now have to follow the climbing tracks in the forest sometimes steeper, sometimes flatter, sometimes reasonably visible, sometimes less recognizable. They initially lead up the western slope of the Gamsjoch north ridge and reach it where it dips into the forest at around 1440m. It is essential to find this point - the AV map shows the previous route quite clearly. At the same time, this point offers the first opportunity to get a reasonably good view of the route - so far it has always gone through forest. From the P6 parking lot, it will take about 1.5 hours to get here.\n\nThe path now becomes pleasantly good for a while: it crosses the screey northern slopes of the Gamsjoch north ridge exactly eastwards towards the lower edge of the Möserkares, always at the upper edge of the very dense mountain pines. Right at the beginning there is flat terrain to walk on, which is a bit uncomfortable (especially later on the descent) - I would call this singletrack terrain, although you need your hands more for moral support and to find your balance occasionally.\n\nDuring the following half hour, I crossed over and wondered how it would continue at the lowest exit of the Möserkares. You head towards the upper exit of the mountain pine belt there - at some point you will recognize a cairn on an embedded patch of rock, from which you can reach the wide saddle (1789m) between Ruederkarspitze and the Roßkopf peak in front. In between, you should take a look at the enormous high mountain landscape in which you are moving: the Falken group opposite with the impressive Blausteigkar deserves particular attention!\n\nAbout 9:15 a.m., I had reached the aforementioned Schrofenfleck with cairn - and was a little perplexed: where would I continue through these energy-sapping mountain pine fields? On the AV map, the small dots that now lead exactly northwards 200m to a stream are very easy to read - but what is required here is mountain pine fighting at its best: 5m up, 10m down, 15m up again, always looking for the least resistance, so I fought my way doggedly through - and finally reached the aforementioned stream, which flows directly down into the Möserkargraben." \nSo far the report (http://www.hikr.org/tour/post12377.html) .\n\nWe don't climb up that far, however, but at an altitude of around 1360m we look for a - pathless - descent option into the streambed of the Möserkargraben below the waterfalls of the two \nspring streams.\n\nRiml/Amor describe a pathless access via the western flank of the Möserkargraben. Here, too, the descent into the stream through the mountain pine fields causes orientation problems.
